

This was a wonderful, insightful read full of interesting Cape Cod facts and legends. When I bought this book I thought I was going to be reading a historical fiction novel so it took me a little while to get used to the fact that it is more of a collection of the author's compiled research on the subject. I almost selfishly wish the author would have just picked and chosen from the various accounts she

heard and made one seamless story of the love affair between Maria Hallett and Sam Bellamy. Then at the end she could have written about the conflicting information and listed all the facts found in her extensive research- one source said she had blonde hair, another said she had black, one source said she saw Sam again, another said she did not, etc, etc. I would find that I would suspend reality and really get into the character and then in the next paragraph I would be knocked out of my reverie by having to recreate the character in my head with the new and conflicting information I was given. This however is my own fault for expecting a novel when it clearly was not intended to be one. Overall this is extremely well done and thoroughly researched and I would recommend it to anyone.

Whether Maria Hallett actually existed, I'd like to think that she did, the book Bellamy's Bride weaves an incredibly beautiful story of a time gone by, when huge sailing ships sailed the ocean. If you have ever stood on the great outer beach of Cape Cod on a windy and cold afternoon and looked out to sea, you have to believe that a good part of the Maria Hallett/Sam Bellamy's story just might be true. The Whydah was found a number of years ago just off of Marconi Beach, I believe; the first authentic pirate ship ever found. Thank you to Kathleen Brunelle for writing this beautiful book. A "must read" for anyone who has any interest in the adventures of pirates, and of the women they most often left behind on some windswept cliff or beach. After reading this great book, I felt as though I had met Maria Hallett and Sam Bellamy personally.
