

If Rick can contact Centro Pico, Dr. Gianpaolo Ziroldi, use the 2nd phone # under "Contacts" (il primo gets you answers like: "Centro Pico e' finito," which isn't true - it was only their HQs that collapsed; just leave voicemail - I bet you'll become their next Local Hero!No kidding....And to think we'll be in Firenze for the 50th anniversary of the terrible floods. In 1970, at San Miniato, I met a young British art student who had been in that city, 1966, trying to save the art. And he told me he had been present when they raised the broken bits of Cimabue's irreplaceable "Crucifixion" out of the sludge. He said: "Grown men wept to see this..." Gone is gone. And as evil persons try to destroy our very Human Heritage, it is worth remembering: Nature, herself can, within an instant, wipe up anything and everything in her path.But the words of G. This is as true today as it was in the late 15th C., when a brash 20-year old Humanist Philosopher, working for il Magnifico, Lorenzo de' Medici, wrote his "Oration on the Dignity of Man" - still considered THE manifesto of the European Renaissance.And like Mr. Steves, Giovanni Pico did a great deal of his writing in Firenze....

Rick Steve's books are the best travel guides I've ever used. For most sights that he recommends, he gives a page by page description that you can read as you walk through that is as good or better than the audio guides. A definite must for travelers.

Another great Rick Steve's Travel Guide. I did not realize the small books have the same info as the Italy Book which is apparently all encompassing.
