

This is an excellent book for beginners to learn from. In common with many recorder books is that it teaches reading music at the same time as the recorder. Also in common with other books is the easy-to-follow reading style. However, what separates this book from the others is the very large number of songs given at the back of the book. About 180 pages worth! That saves the reader having to find their own practice songs after finishing all the lessons. Another thoughtful benefit of this book is the spiral binding. Makes playing while reading from the book much easier! The only improvement I could wish for are some audio samples of some of the exercises, to demonstrate what to achieve. However, this is a minor quibble.
